For the past four years Indigo Girls Group has evolved to become a thriving network of young women supporting, educating, and lifting up fellow young women. Through diverse mediums, we have aimed to educate and create spaces for discussion on poignant societal themes for girls', locally and globally. This past year in particular, we have fostered an evolving narrative on what it truly means to empower and engage together as women and girls of today. We have welcomed new programming for high school girls, focused efforts on developing a sexual and reproductive health education proposal, expanded with three new branches, established community collaborations, and ran our first-ever empowerment conference. 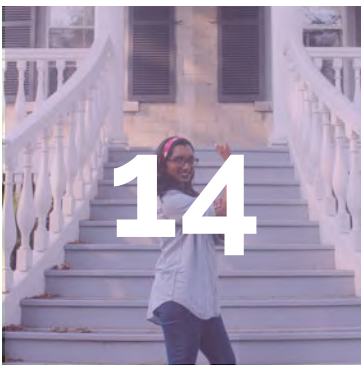

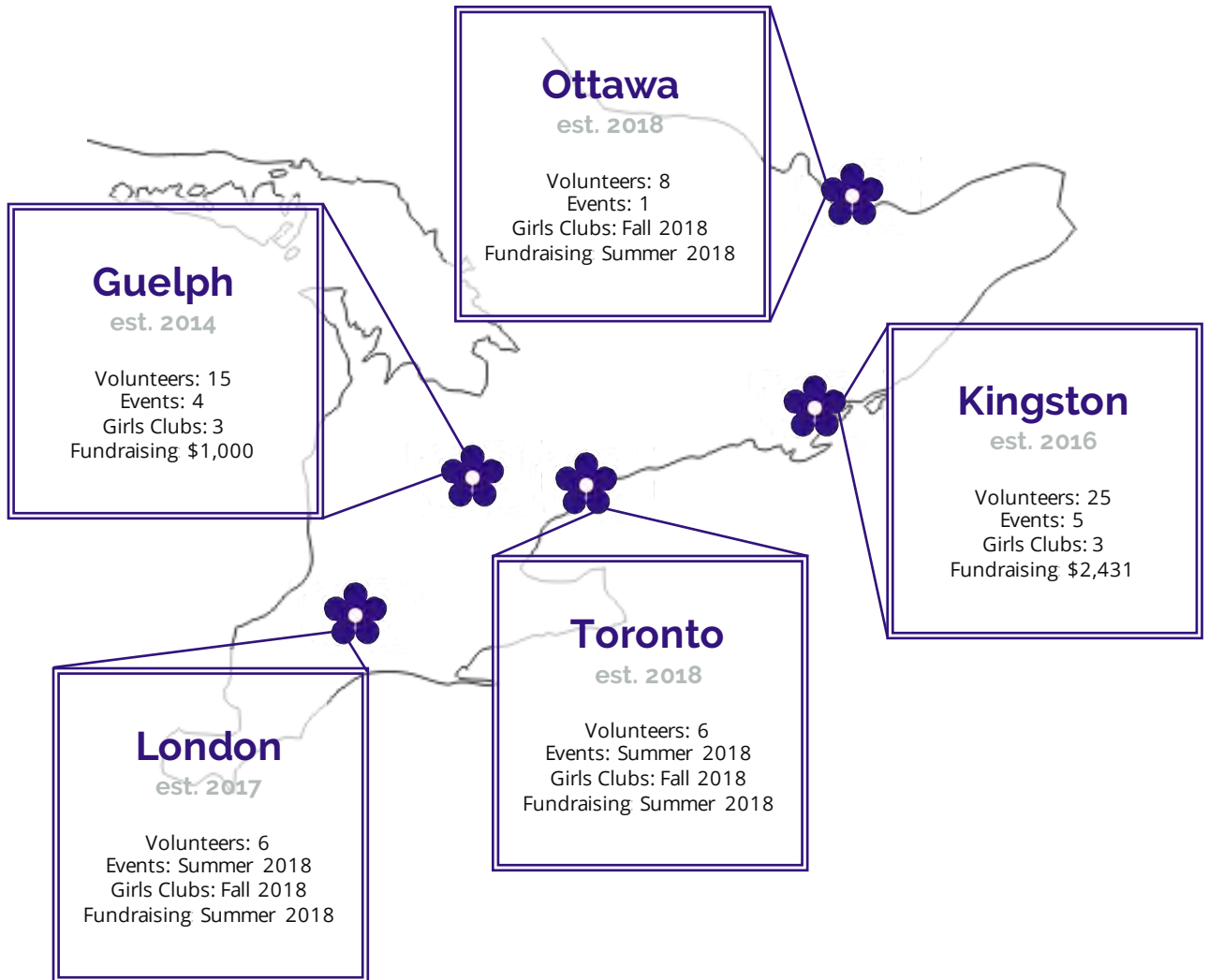

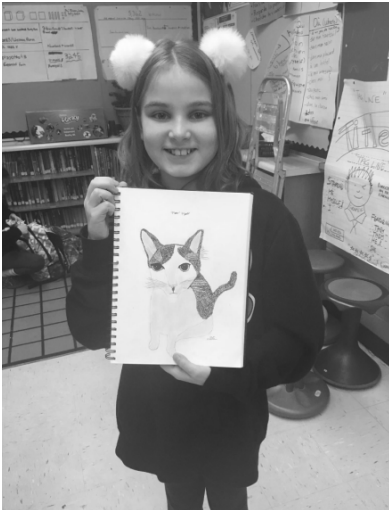

How do you make sure you've met the expectations of participants of the program?

“I would say them just coming back, wanting to come back and having that relationship with us is how I would say their expectations are met. Also, when we do reflective pieces within the club, we try to have a takeaway for each week. For example, we did Indigo Girls passports: you had to write stamps and things you've learned from Indigo Girls so there has been a lot of different areas within the club where I've seen the girls being rewarded from what we're doing. One of the girls' passport said, “how to take care of myself both mentally and physically.” I feel like that's something their eyes wouldn't have been open to if not for us, so I feel that's another way their expectations are being fulfilled as well.”

Our girl's clubs cost approximately \$300 per club, per semester. This year we ran 3 clubs in both the Guelph and Kingston branches. In addition to this cost we ran a successful conference in our Kingston community. Costs of this conference included the space, take away, food and material for programming and workshops. Administration costs include website costs, (\$200/year) domain fees (\$13/year), e-mail costs (\$30/month) and bank fees (\$10/month).

Net \$3,252.99

This net revenue will directly go into organizational growth and programming development. Costs are associated with registration for provincial non-profit status. With the additional funding we will also be opening two new girls clubs in established branches (Guelph and Kingston) as well as beginning girls clubs in all new branches (London, Ottawa and Toronto).

Building Lessons in Sexual Health Stories

Project Goal: Assess sexual and reproductive health (SRH) needs, design programming and create a learning space for high school girls in the Kingston community by building lessons in sexual health stories.

In 2013, an assessment of sexual knowledge of Ontario adolescents who completed their high school sexual education requirements, demonstrated significant gaps in sexual knowledge including reproductive physiology, contraception, HIV/AIDs and sexual assault. Sexual and reproductive health (SRH) becomes increasingly complicated with the intersection of youth, gender, and vulnerability. Spaces for girls to connect on these topics outside of the classroom are limited. While changes made in the Ontario secondary school curriculum as of 2015 have addressed many of the gaps in SRH education, extensive research is yet to evaluate the experience students have with these lessons. This work, amongst others, indicates a need to create SRH programming informed by evidence-based research enriched with participatory elements. With a diverse population and two post-secondary institutions, Kingston provides an ideal location to perform this research evaluation.

“This research will work to improve the sexual and reproductive health (SRH) landscape for adolescent high school girls in Kingston and subsequently Southwestern Ontario throughout the next five years.”

This study aims to critically assess, create and implement an ongoing SRH learning space for Kingston's high school girls. Through a scoping review of current literature on SRH education we will conduct an assessment on the SRH education knowledge, perceptions, gaps and lived-experiences of high school girls (age 14-18) in Kingston through focus group discussions and surveys. Additional key informant interviews with SRH practitioners and parents will bolster these findings and add diverse gendered perspectives. The subsequent analyses will be used to identify unmet SRH needs in Kingston's high school girls and to inform the implementation of SRH programming that aims to build lessons in sexual health stories.

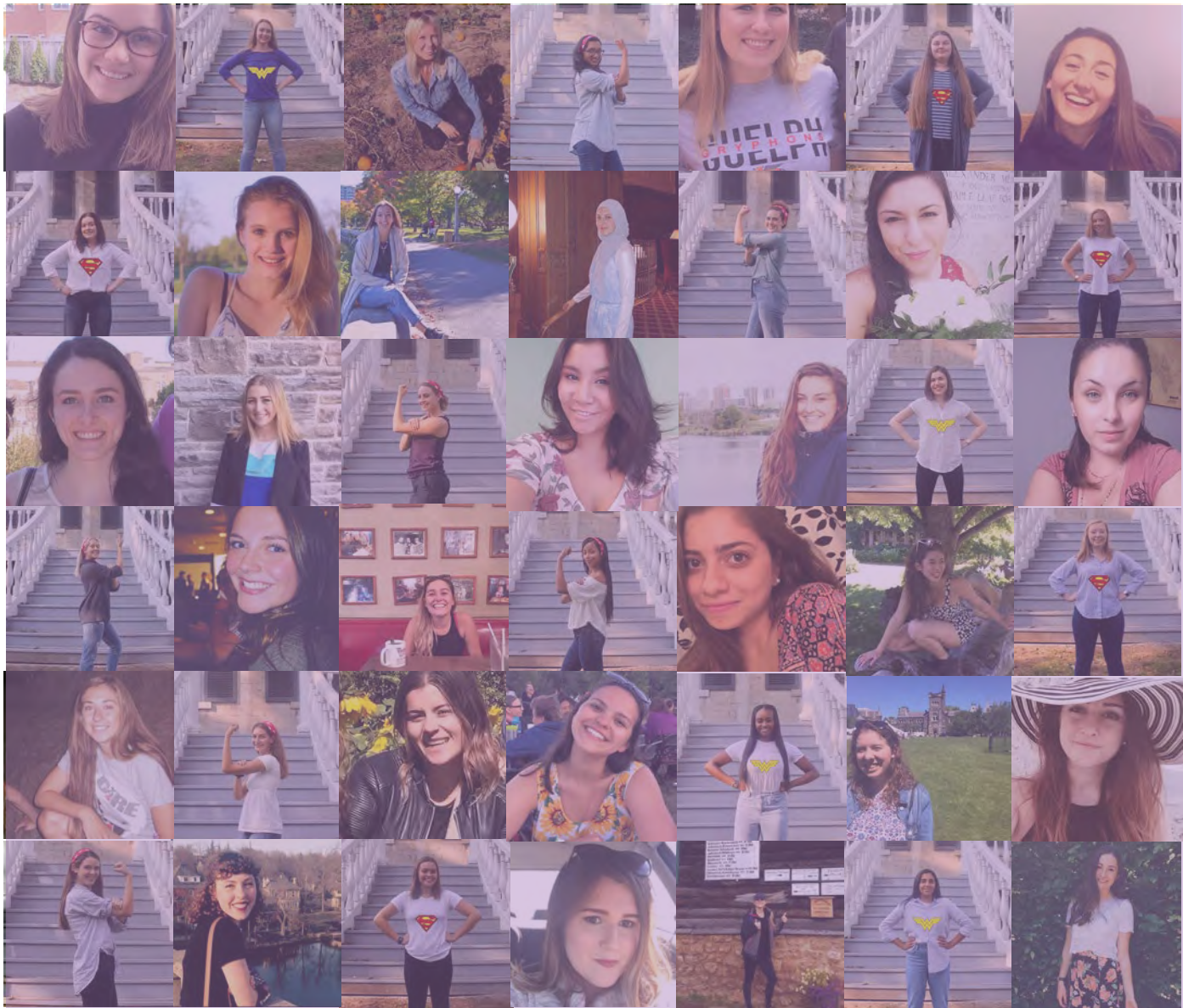
